Introduction

- 1. After seventy years of Babylonian captivity, the nation of Judah was released to go rebuild the temple of God in Jerusalem (<u>Ez. 1:1-4</u>)
 - a. The people began this great work (<u>Ez. 1:5-6</u>)
 - b. Their enemies frustrated their purpose and the work ceased for a time (<u>Ez.</u>
 <u>4</u>)
 - c. God sent two prophets, Haggai and Zechariah, to get the people to resume the work (<u>Ez. 5:1-2</u>)
 - i. The fear of the LORD was involved (<u>Hag. 1:12</u>)
 - d. The temple was completed and dedicated (Ez. 5-6)
- 2. After the Passover was kept, Ezra came to Jerusalem
 - a. He was a priest (<u>Ez. 7:1-5</u>, <u>11-12</u>)
 - b. He was a skilled scribe in the Law of Moses (Ez. 7:6)
 - c. He came with a definite purpose (<u>Ez. 7:10</u>)

I. Seek the Law of the LORD

- 1. With the temple rebuilt, the temple service needed to be restored
 - a. Ezra was the perfect man for the job because he was expert in the words of the commandments of the LORD (<u>Ez. 7:11</u>)
 - b. He knew exactly what the Law of Moses said for he had written it down as one of the duties of a scribe (<u>Ps. 119:11</u>)
- 2. Ezra gathered the people he needed to restore the temple service
 - a. He took with him leaders (Ez. 7:27-28)
 - b. When he discovered temple servants were missing, he sent for them (Ez. <u>8:15-20</u>)
 - c. Ezra proclaimed a fast and prayed to God to seek the right way (<u>Ez. 8:21-</u> <u>23</u>)
- 3. Ezra made ready the necessary articles and offerings for the temple (<u>Ez. 8:24-</u><u>30</u>)
 - a. He had the money and articles weighed prior to transporting them (Ez. 8:25-27)

II. Obey the Law of the LORD

1. Ezra and the people arrived at Jerusalem (Ez. 8:32)

- a. The silver and gold were weighed, and the weight written down (<u>Ez. 8:33-</u> <u>34</u>)
- b. Burnt offerings were made (<u>Ez. 8:35</u>)
- c. Additional support was given (Ez. 8:36)
- d. They were executing on the Law of the LORD
- 2. A problem of intermarriage was brought to Ezra (Ez. 9:1-2)
 - a. This violated the Law of the LORD and resulted in Ezra mourning (<u>Ez. 9:3-4</u>; cf. <u>Dt. 7:1-5</u>)
 - b. Ezra confessed the transgression in prayer (<u>Ez. 9:5-15</u>)
- 3. The people made it right by obeying the Law of the LORD (Ez. 10)
 - a. The people could not stay in their unapproved marriages (Ez. 10:1-4)
 - b. The people came out of their unapproved marriages (Ez. 10:5-44)
 - c. Many are in unauthorized marriages today and if they wish to go to heaven, they must come out of them (<u>Mt. 19:1-12</u>)

III. Teach the Law of the LORD

- 1. Ezra stood up and taught the Law of the LORD (<u>Neh. 8:1-12</u>)
 - a. Reading was involved (<u>Neh. 8:2-6</u>)
 - b. It was necessary not only to hear, but <u>understand</u> the Law (<u>Neh. 8:7-8</u>)
- 2. Through the teaching, the people understood the day was holy to the LORD (<u>Neh. 8:9-12</u>)
 - a. We must teach so that the message of God's Word is clearly and unmistakably understood
 - b. Let us be sure we are growing enough to be teachers ourselves (<u>Heb. 5:12-</u> <u>14</u>)

Conclusion

- 1. Ezra was a great man of God and a wonderful example of reverence
 - a. He prepared his heart to seek the Law of the LORD
 - b. He prepared his heart to obey the Law of the LORD
 - c. He prepared his heart to teach the Law of the LORD
- 2. The world will be a much better place if we follow the great example of Ezra
 - a. So too will the church!
